## **UTM CRIMINAL JUSTICE ALUMNI SURVEY 2016 RESULTS**

The UTM Criminal Justice Alumni Survey was mailed to 163 graduates of the program for the years 2010 to 2015 in the Spring 2016 semester (23.93% response rate). There were a total of 39 respondents, one who didn't include the signed informed consent statement, and six surveys returned as undeliverable. Of these graduates, 35.89% transferred in to UTM from a community college or other four-year institution. The respondents were 61.5% female, 38.5% males, 53.8% of whom were currently working in the criminal justice field. Twenty-five percent (25%) were working in law enforcement. A total of 84.6% of respondents were either *satisfied* or *very satisfied* with their current position. Fourteen (35.9%) of the respondents participated in an internship, and all who participated in an internship agreed that an internship should be a degree requirement for criminal justice students.
