UT Martin continues to partner with 30+ area school districts to ensure the development of teacher education candidates possess the knowledge and skills necessary to become successful classroom teachers. The EPP analyzes employer and completer satisfaction surveys to identify specific district needs to be incorporated into our coursework or used for content design for professional development. UT Martin provides several opportunities for observation and teaching practice for all undergraduate and graduate initial licensure candidates before the Residency II (student teaching) semester. The undergraduate program, Teacher Education 302/305, and the graduate program Teacher Education 730 contain early classroom experiences both in the field and virtually. Students are tasked with observing student behavior and teacher/mentor strategies in the classroom. These courses focus on planning, instruction, assessment, teaching and learning styles, and understanding students from diverse backgrounds. Students reflect on these

experiences and in TCED 305 also engage in learning activities to assist in matching strategies with the needs of students in poverty. Both courses require 30 hours of field experience as an introduction to planning and instruction in a classroom setting. Poverty is also part of the new diversity course content. The SPED 440 course contains differentiated lesson plan development. All literacy courses have a component related to English language learners. The majors in the Department of Education Studies (PreK, K-5, Middle, Secondary, and SPED) enroll in "Residency I" the semester prior to Residency II (student teaching). These majors have incorporated innovation models into courses. The innovation models include foundational literacy skills instructions for elementary and special education interventionists. Trauma-informed instruction modules are also included in the courses. Both of these innovative modules align with state requirements for TN Literacy Success Act and meet needs based on partnership collaboration. The modules are in undergraduate and graduate courses. In an effort to align with TN Literacy Success Act requirements, TCED 475/READ 742, Early Literacy Practicum, has been revised to include foundational literacy skills innovation models that incorporate a practicum experience where the students apply these skills in a real-world Kindergarten, First Grade, or Second Grade setting. This experience consists of 36 hours in a K-2 classroom. The undergraduate Residency I experience consists of classroom instruction for all methods courses for 7 weeks and then the last 7 weeks of the term are spent full-time in a supervised placement. The implementation of this experience has increased the number of field hours for these majors from 75 hours to a total of nearly 350 hours of supervised instruction immediately prior to the culminating experience. The graduate initial licensure program is structured as an accelerated program but all require field experiences during the methods course term also. The experiences described afford the students the opportunity to practice effective teaching strategies used in rural and urban school settings. The Residency and other field experiences not only allow practice for planning and instruction but contain service learning activities as well. Students are exposed to diversity in the areas of race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status within our region. TCED 303 (Diagnosis & Assessment) has been revised to provide a more in-depth look at the Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System (TVAAS). Students are required to take five self-paced modules that help the students further understand, interpret, and use TVAAS value-added analysis to inform practices and accelerate student achievement. Students discuss strategies and best practices to meet the needs of students based on this data analysis. They learn to access reports to compare students, classes, schools, and districts to inform and develop strategies and instruction. All education majors in the unit receive training to understand and address special needs students in Special Education 300/500. All candidates seeking initial licensure enroll in READ 438, READ 433, or READ 700 (graduate). Since RTI2 is mandated for reading in Tennessee, a learning module that includes instruction, video, and reflection is now included in the delivery of READ 438/READ 433/READ 700 to better equip teacher candidates to understand their role and function in RTI2. There have been additional literacy initiatives implemented in the state of Tennessee and coursework is continually assessed to ensure all literacy standards are met. Response to Intervention and Instruction (RTI2) is another initiative. Several courses have added instruction to assess student needs and the specific interventions required for remediation in Tier 2 and 3 of RTI2. The final initiative is the yearly assessment of K-12 students from the Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Program (T-CAP) which includes TN Ready assessment for grades 3-8 and End of Course exams that pertain to specific high school subjects. TCED 303 includes instructions to use these assessments as SPED 460/660 focuses on special education assessment. Both courses offer instruction in RTI2 assessment and the interpretation of data resulting from these exams. Our school district partners expressed the need for our students to have more instruction and practice to interpret test data. As a result, both courses added modules for data interpretation and the response to that data provided by the Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System (TVAAS). In an effort to address partner needs, the EPP has modified the previous classroom management content to be more specific to behavior management. It was implemented in the fall 2023 term for all majors. This change was made to train candidates on how to reduce inappropriate and disruptive student behavior, promote student responsibility for academic work and behavior, and improve student academic achievement. Additionally, the EPP has recently modified the curriculum in all majors to require a diversity course. The diversity course was offered in spring of 2024. We will be a new rotation in the curriculum. The EPP office is excited to review pre and post data after a couple of semesters of the course being implemented.

Technology is covered extensively in all educator preparation programs. Human Learning 311, Educational Studies 750, Fine Arts 300, and Music 108 are all technology classes offered for specific programs. Each of the classes cover technology and its integration for the specific major. In addition to the specific technology classes listed above, technology usage is integrated throughout the curriculum. All classrooms are equipped with technology that students can actively use in class presentations. Students are trained on how to various apps and modalities to use in their P-12 classrooms. For example, students learn how to use the SmartBoard prior to beginning the student teaching semester. Instruction includes but is not limited to, data collection, data management, and data analysis. TCED 303 (Diagnosis & Assessment) has been revised to provide a more in-depth look at the Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System (TVAAS). Students are required to take five self-paced modules which help the students further understand, interpret, and use TVAAS value-added analysis to inform practices and accelerate student progress. Students discuss strategies and best practices that meet the needs of all students. They are also given instructions on how to access reports for comparison among classes, schools, and districts. Special Education 440/640 addresses the need for differentiated instruction by using multi-methodologies to reach all students. Universal design for learning is required to be used in all lesson plans throughout the curriculum. A learning module focused on Response to Intervention and Instruction (RTI2) has been added to READ 438, the elementary reading methods course, READ 433, middle/secondary methods, and READ 700, graduate initial licensure. Typically, reading disabilities are identified by teachers in grades PreK-5. All candidates seeking licensure in PreK-5th grade enroll in READ 438. Since RTI2 is mandated for reading in Tennessee, a learning module that includes instruction, video, and reflection is n

several important educational initiatives in the state of Tennessee. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, students learned how to use various forms of technology to reach their students and complete their coursework. For example, Zoom was used to communicate with classes. Pre-service teachers also used Zoom and Canvas Studio for evaluation and reflection. The use of GoReact began in Fall of 2021. Residency II (student teaching) candidates completed training to be Google Classroom certified in order to better assist partner schools and clinical mentors with online learning.

## **Teacher Training**

  - a. Teach students with disabilities effectively

All EPP candidates are trained in working with students with disabilities, members of individualized education program teams, and limited English proficient students. All majors take Special Education 300/500, SPED 680, and several majors also require Special Education 440/640. In addition to these two special education classes, TCED 302/305 and the literacy courses cover instruction of limited English proficient learners. All methods courses require candidates to create lessons that always differentiate instruction, provide support for students with an IEP, and provide strategies for accommodating ELL students. To address the requirements of Response to Intervention (RTI), specific instruction on reading interventions and curriculum-based probes are included in the required reading courses, READ 438, READ 433, or READ 700. The assignment includes a case study with testing and implementation of specific strategies.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act*.

All majors take Special Education 300/500, SPED 680, and several majors also require Special Education 440/640. Pre-service candidates in general education are required to take two special education courses, SPED 300 and 440 courses have a component in which preservice candidates have an introduction to the IEP meeting and the development of the IEP for students identified as having special needs. SPED 440 in particular teaches students to differentiate instruction and provides strategies for the tiers of RTI (Response to Intervention). Graduate students take SPED 680, Strategies for Differentiation in the Inclusive Classroom. To support these special education courses, other general education courses ask pre-service candidates to plan for differentiated instruction in lesson plans and teaching simulations in the classroom. The Residency I coursework and other methods courses within the EPP unit require candidates to create lessons that always differentiate instruction and provide support for students with an IEP.

Candidates enrolled in all literacy courses (READ 438, READ 475, READ 433, and READ 448) complete multiple assignments (including lesson plan development) that meet the needs of English language learners in the classroom.

a. Teach students with disabilities effectively

The special education program at UT Martin prepares students to work with students with disabilities, participate as a member of individualized education program teams, and work with students who are limited English proficient learners. The program consists of twenty-eight hours of special education coursework that covers a vast amount of information. Students in the special education program at UT Martin are trained in grades P-12.

UT Martin's special education majors are considered well prepared by the local school districts in which they student teach and are hired as full-time employees. UT Martin currently offers special education licensure as K-8 Interventionist and 6-12 Interventionist. The EPP recently submitted a specialty area program proposal to the TN State Department of Education for the integrated early childhood program. Upon state and university curriculum approval, this program will be implemented in Fall 2024.

b. Participate as a member of individualized education program teams, as defined in section 614(d)(1)(B) of the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.* 

Pre-service candidates in special education receive coursework that supports teaching a variety of students with special needs. In addition to the subject knowledge required of all teachers, these candidates take courses to address differentiating instruction, assessment in special education, behavior interventions, special education law and requirements, and students with intellectual disabilities. These candidates take some of the courses required of regular education candidates in lesson planning and field experiences.

c. Effectively teach students who are limited English proficient.

The needs of ELL students are incorporated into SPED 440, a course where differentiating instruction and universal design for learning are the focus, as well as, all literacy courses available to all majors.
